The **United Nations Entity for Gender Equality and the Empowerment of Women (UN Women)** was established in 2010 by the United Nations General Assembly to promote gender equality and empower women and girls worldwide. Delegates then engage in moderated caucuses to discuss specific aspects of the topic in greater detail, followed by unmoderated caucuses where they negotiate, build alliances, and draft resolutions. Draft resolutions are formally introduced, debated, amended when necessary, and eventually voted upon by the committee. Successful delegates are expected to demonstrate diplomacy, collaboration, and a strong understanding of both the topic and their country's policies.

UN Women remains highly relevant in today's world as gender inequality continues to affect millions of people across different societies. Challenges such as online gender-based violence, unequal access to education and employment, discrimination, and the disproportionate impact of conflict on women require international attention and cooperation. By providing a platform for dialogue

and policy development, UN Women enables member states to address these issues collectively and work toward a more equitable future.
